Purpose

1 To present a report from the Wanaka Community Board Chair.

2015 Meeting Dates

- 3 As we approach the end of 2014, the Board needs to adopt a meeting schedule for 2015. I would like to signal that I have been somewhat dissatisfied with the six-weekly meeting cycle used in 2014 as it does not have a natural rhythm to me, nor does it correspond with the Council's monthly meeting cycle or the publication of the monthly report. I believe that we need to establish a meeting recurrence which is easy to remember and I therefore wish to propose a change to our current approach.
- 4 Firstly, I understand that the Council has determined that its workshops will occur on Tuesdays, and they will generally take place in Queenstown. This means that, in order to avoid creating a clash for the three Wanaka Councillors, the Board needs to consider altering the day of the week on which its meetings take place. I therefore propose that the Board's meeting day should be Wednesday and that the Board 'drop in' sessions move to the first Monday of every month (except January).

- 5 Next year I would like to hold a Wanaka Community Board meeting of some sort from 10am until 12noon every second week. Meetings that are held on the same day and at the same time of the month work well for the public, but I am aware that at present we do not have enough business to merit a formal Wanaka Community Board meeting every month. Accordingly, I propose that the Board hold a formal meeting on the third Wednesday of every second month, with a workshop on the alternate month (on the third Wednesday) for general issues and an infrastructure/operations workshop on the first Wednesday of every month.
- 6 I realise this sounds rather complicated but it is actually very simple, as you will see on the attached 2015 calendar where the various meetings have been plotted out and colour-coded.
- 7 I believe that this approach will work well for feeding items from workshops and meetings into Council, as I understand that Council meetings will remain on the last Thursday of the month.

Glendhu Bay Boat Ramp

8 A building consent for the ramp is currently being sought and when approved, the ramp will be constructed. The project is still on track for completion by this summer.

Navigation Safety Bylaw and Dog Control Bylaw and Policy

9 The final versions of both the Navigation Safety Bylaw and the Dog Control Bylaw and Policy will be presented to the Council meeting scheduled to take place on 27 November 2014.

Proposed Alcohol Ban Bylaw

- 10 Council adopted the draft Alcohol Ban Bylaw for public consultation at the meeting held on 25 September 2014. The consultation period closes on 29 October 2014 and the Board may wish to make a submission.
- 11 In developing the draft Bylaw, consideration was given to extending the ban area in Hawea to include the footpath and foreshore from the camping ground and causeway on Capell Avenue to prevent littering issues, as there is anecdotal evidence of littering in this area from large beach parties. However, despite the police recommendation to include this area, it was not supported by staff and was not included in the draft bylaw released for public consultation. The Board may wish to submit on this subject, but it is important also to have regard to the new statutory test for bylaws and to consider whether under this test, an extension can by justified.
- 12 There is now a requirement under the Local Government Act 2002 that before making a bylaw intended to replace an expiring bylaw, the Council must be satisfied that a high level of crime or disorder is likely to arise, that is, crime and disorder that is caused or made worse by alcohol consumption will occur unless the bylaw is made.

13 The staff report to the full Council meeting at which the draft Bylaw was adopted for consultation stated that it would be 'questionable' if the addition of this area in Hawea met the new statutory threshold. The Board may wish to make a submission seeking its inclusion (or any other areas) but I have reservations about the value of this in light of the new statutory position.

Wanaka Fire Station Building

- 14 Plans were announced in April 2014 for the construction of a new fire station in Wanaka to be located in Ballantyne Road. Building consent has been obtained and tenders called for and it is anticipated that building will be completed and operational by late 2015. This means that the present Wanaka Volunteer Fire Service building located at 45 Ardmore Street will become superfluous to the Fire Service's requirements within the foreseeable future.
- 15 It is directly adjacent to the Council's present Wanaka office at 47 Ardmore Street and its acquisition would bring the block of land containing the service centre, carpark, former St John building and lane into the Council's ownership. In my view this is consistent with the first principle of the Council's Property Sale and Acquisition Policy adopted in March 2014 which states that the Council will own land (and buildings) where they are necessary to deliver its statutory duties, that is, are directly related or necessarily incidental to its core purpose or functions.
- 16 The rating valuation is \$800,000 for the land plus \$90,000 for the improvement so the purchase price could be around \$1m. Notwithstanding this, I believe that there is value in investigating further the possible purchase and ask the Board to support my recommendation that the Council undertake such an investigation.

Wanaka Sports Facility and Wanaka Community Pool

- 17 At the time of writing, the Council will adopt a statement of proposal for the Wanaka Swimming Pool at an extraordinary Council meeting scheduled for 9 October 2014. This will be followed by a four week consultation period, with submissions closing on 14 November.
- 18 The Council will hear submitters who wish to be heard at hearings pencilled in for 8 and 9 December. These hearings will take place in Wanaka.

Reports from Liaison Positions, Community Associations and recent Council meetings

19. Members are invited to report on the Board-related activities they have been involved in since the date of the last meeting and Councillors are asked to comment on any matters of interest to the Board from the recent Council meeting.
