MINUTE (17 July 2018)

Introduction

- [1] This Minute starts to address the timing of management of the 101 (approximately) appeals to the Environment Court on the Queenstown Lakes District Council's proposed second-generation Queenstown Lakes District Plan, Stage 1 ("the PDP").
- [2] The court records that the Council sought directions in anticipation of appeals being lodged on the Stage 1 decision. In a Minute dated 26 April 2018 the court directed (*inter alia*) that the Council lodge an analysis of appeals by topic. That report is due to be lodged and served (electronically) on 31 July 2018. However, on 13 July 2018 the Council lodged a memorandum in which Ms K L Hockly, its counsel, first advised where the Council's work on the appeals has got to, and second asking for an extension of the full reporting date to 17 August 2018.
- [3] The Council has made considerable progress. Counsel advises that it has:



- uploaded all appeals onto its website;
- completed its review of all appeals; and
- identified the Council's proposed topic allocation for each individual appeal point, the jurisdictional issues that arise from the Council's perspective, and all appeals requiring further particulars.

[4] In relation to the last point it has identified:

- approximately 175 appeal points that raise potential jurisdictional issues (some being jurisdictional matters raised by appellants and the majority being issues of the scope of the appeals identified by the Council); and
- approximately 90 appeal points where the Council considers that it would be helpful for further particulars to be provided for the purposes of mediation.
- [5] In the court's view the proceedings do <u>not</u> need to wait for the Council's full report much of which will relate to appeals about specific rules and specific areas of land to be lodged, before any jurisdictional and procedural issues can be resolved or before timetabling towards substantive hearings is set in place.
- [6] Consequently, the court considers it is appropriate for the parties to start thinking about, and if necessary make applications in respect of, some aspects of the procedure to be followed, earlier rather than later.

Information on all proceedings and procedures

- [7] The parties should note for their convenience that in addition to the court's records which are kept separately (and repetitively) on each appeal file, the court's Minutes containing all its directions are being loaded by the Queenstown Lakes District Council on its database and are searchable at https://www.qldc.govt.nz/planning/district-plan/
- [8] The procedures of the Environment Court are set out in the court's Practice Notes at www.environmentcourt.govt.nz/about/practice-note/. Normally the Environment Court expects those directions to be followed, in the absence of specific directions to the contrary.



The steps towards a hearing

- [9] Preparation for and the hearing of the appeals is likely to be in stages as follows:
 - (1) collecting of similar appeals by topic (see the next heading);
 - (2) procedural and jurisdictional hearings where rulings are sought by any party;
 - (3) prehearing conferences (where the court considers they are necessary for any topic, which is likely for the strategic topics);
 - (4) alternative dispute resolution (if mediation is directed on any topic);
 - (5) service and lodgement of evidence-in-chief (normally with the Council going first);
 - (6) expert conferencing;
 - (7) service and lodgement of rebuttal evidence;
 - (8) hearing.
- [10] We elaborate on most of those steps below. First we set out our initial thoughts on the clustering of appeals by topic.

Hearing by topic

- [11] The court suggests the following general approach to the clustering of appeals:
 - (1) appeals on related topics should be (mediated and) heard together;
 - (2) appeals relating to higher order issues should be dealt with first.
- [12] While the detailed analysis of topics (and other matters) from the QLDC is still to be lodged, it is apparent to the court from an initial reading of the notices of appeal that the first set of topics can be identified simply by reference to the Strategic Directions in Chapter 3 of the PDP and the directly related subsequent chapters.
- [13] These can be split into six topics corresponding broadly to the Strategic Objectives¹ in Chapter 3 of the PDP as follows:

We refer to these as "the strategic topics".

[14] It appears the general order of the first round of appeal hearings should reflect the strategic objectives Chapter 3 of the PDP, except that the Rural landscapes (topic 2) should go before Urban development (topic 3) given the general movement (historically) of land from country urban.

[15] We attach lists of the appellants who seek relief in respect of the first three strategic topics as follows:

Schedule A: appellants on topic 1
Schedule B: appellants on topic 2
Schedule C: appellants on topic 3.

Procedural hearings and prehearing conferences

[16] Procedural applications will be set down for separate early hearings in relation to the specific appeals named in the applications (i.e. not necessarily by topic) on a case-by-case basis.

- [17] We note the Council's and other parties' allegations over the lack of jurisdiction and/or particulars on a large number of appeals. We will issue directions about those matters because they need to be resolved soon.
- [18] In addition to procedural hearings which are likely to be set down at short notice, the parties should note that prehearing conferences are likely to be held in Queenstown in the weeks of:
 - 3 September 2018 for topic 1
 - 17 September 2018 for topic 2.

At least some hearings of procedural matters may take place on those dates also (if not heard earlier).

Alternative Dispute Resolution

- [19] The court has given considerable thought to whether it should direct mediation of all appeals relating to all the strategic topics. Our initial view is that a general order for mediation of topics 1 and 2 is inappropriate.
- [20] We accept that the court usually directs that mediation (by an Environment Commissioner) takes place, almost as a matter of course. We anticipate the appeals before the court will be no exception in relation to most topics.
- [21] However, in relation to the first two strategic topics we have doubts as to whether mediation of all issues is justified for three reasons:
 - most of the relevant objectives and policies are very abstract, so discussions could take an inordinate amount of time;
 - (2) the cost to the parties would be considerable which is of concern when there is (in our view) a high probability that hearings on some sub-topics will be needed in any event; and
 - (3) the time spent in preparing for mediation might be better spent in preparing evidence and then in expert conferencing once evidence is served.



[22] In our preliminary view if <u>nearly all</u> (in the court's view) of the parties to topics 1 and 2 agree that mediation has a reasonable prospect of success (or of narrowing the issues if that is a meaningful concept at the level of abstraction in Chapter 3 of the PDP) then the court may direct that alternative dispute resolution under sections 268 and 268A RMA should take place in September 2018.

[23] However, we will reserve leave for the parties to make applications on this as on most of the other matters raised by this Minute.

Timetable for evidence and conferencing on topic 1 (A resilient economy)

[24] With a view to holding hearings on the appeals on this topic (for a list of the relevant appeals, see Schedule A) in the weeks of **18 and 25 February 2019** in Queenstown, we suggest a timetable as follows (subject to any orders as to alternative dispute resolution and any jurisdictional issues):

evidence-in-chief for Queenstown Lakes District Council; 21 September 2018 evidence-in-chief for the appellants; 12 October 2018 evidence-in-chief for section 274 parties supporting appellants; 26 October 2018 evidence-in-chief for section 274 parties opposing appellants; 9 November 2018 19 Nov to 7 Dec 2018 expert conferencing to take place; Joint Witness Statements to be lodged; 12 December 2018 rebuttal evidence for appellants and supporting section 274 20 December 2018 parties; rebuttal evidence for QLDC together with a memorandum 23 January 2019 suggesting order of dealing with topics and the estimated hearing time for each; rebuttal evidence for section 274 parties supporting the QLDC; 30 January 2019 the QLDC should compile and lodge five (5) hard copies of all 5 February 2019

Timetable for evidence and conferencing on topic 2 (Rural landscapes)

[25] With a view to holding hearings on the appeals on topic 2 in the weeks of 1, 8 and 15 April 2019 in Queenstown, we suggest a timetable as follows (subject to any orders as to alternative dispute resolution and any jurisdictional issues):

evidence on the first strategic topics to be heard.



5 October 2018 evidence-in-chief for Queenstown Lakes District Council;

2 November 2018 evidence-in-chief for the appellants;

9 November 2018 evidence-in-chief for s 274 parties supporting appellants;

30 November 2018 evidence-in-chief for s 274 parties opposing appellants;

10 Dec to 5 Feb 2019 expert conferencing to take place;

8 February 2019 Joint Witness Statements to be lodged by the relevant experts;

15 February 2019 rebuttal evidence for appellants and supporting s 274 parties;

8 March 2019 rebuttal evidence for QLDC together with a memorandum;

15 March 2019 rebuttal evidence for s 274 parties supporting the QLDC;

22 March 2019 the QLDC should compile and lodge 5 hard copies of all evidence.

[26] Where any party (appellant, QLDC, or s 274 party) has given an electronic address for service then we suggest a direction that service of evidence may be carried out electronically unless the party being served has given prior notice to all other parties to the relevant appeals (on the relevant topic) that it expects hard copies of the evidence.

[27] The parties should note that delays in hearing topic 1 (if the timetable suggested above is not actually set) do not necessarily mean that the timetable and hearing dates for topic 2 will be deferred also.

[28] The parties should note that the Principal Environment Judge has directed that in view of their importance, the appeals on topics 1 and 2 be heard by a larger than normal Environment Court comprising two Judges and two Commissioners. This means that in addition to electronic lodgement of the evidence, five (5) hard copies of all evidence will need to be lodged with the QLDC at the time of service.

[29] Decisions are likely to be issued in sequence. They may include interim decisions.

Other hearings

- [30] Timetables for mediation of other topics will be set after receipt of the Council's reporting memorandum.
- [31] Subsequent chapters from 7 to 26 of the ODP may be able to be heard by separate divisions of the court, for example:



- Chapter 12 Queenstown Town Centre
- Chapter 13 Wanaka Town Centre
- Chapter 28 Natural Hazards.

[32] Arguments over specific definitions (Chapter 2 of the ODP) will be considered when they first become relevant.

Directions

Waivers

[33] Under section 281 RMA the court:

- (1) grants the application for leave to file an amended notice of appeal for RCL Henley Downs & Others (ENV-2018-CHC-102) and directs that their notice of appeal be replaced with the 10 July 2018 version;
- (2) waives late lodgement of two appeals by Lake McKay Station Ltd & Boyd, Redai & others; and
- (3) extends the period for joining the appeals in (1) and (2) above under section 274 RMA to 27 July 2018;
- (4) the date for the Council to lodge its full analysis of the appeals is extended to 24 August 2018 (giving more time than sought in view of other commitments imposed below).

Topics 1, 2 (and 3)

[34] The court directs that:

- (1) any appellant who is not listed in one of Schedules A to C, which relate to topics 1 to 3 respectively, and who thinks they should be, <u>must</u> advise the Registrar and the parties to that appeal within 10 working days of receipt of this Minute;
- (2) applications for:
 - (a) strikeout of any part of any appeal on topics (1) and (2) on grounds of lack of jurisdiction; and/or



- (b) further particulars of the relief sought in any notice of appeal in respect of topics (1) and (2)
- must be lodged and served by 3 August 2018.
- (3) in relation to topics 1 and 2 any application for directions as to alternative case management, mediation, timetabling of service of evidence, or hearing of these strategic topics must be lodged and served by 10 August 2018 (or such further time as the court allows).

All other topics

- (1) In relation to all other topics, once these have been confirmed / identified by the Council, applications for:
 - (a) strikeout of any part of any appeal on grounds of lack of jurisdiction; and/or
 - (b) further particulars of the relief sought
 - should be lodged and served by 2 November 2018.
- (2) procedural applications in respect of all other topics must be lodged by 16 November 2018.

Leave required

[35] Leave is reserved to any party to apply for further directions in respect of any of the appeals.
