The Current Situation

Currently heritage structures, buildings, places and groups of buildings are listed in the Inventory of Protected Features in the District Plan (Appendix 3) and identified on the planning maps. Each item is categorised as Category 1, 2 or 3.

Rules in the District Plan require different levels of consent for alteration or removal of each category of heritage structure, building or place.

The purpose of this process is to ensure alteration to heritage items is carried out in a sensitive manner and that removal is carefully considered.



Issues

We've identified the following issues related to heritage buildings and places:

Protection of archaeological sites

Fourteen archaeological sites are listed in the Inventory of Protected Features and are protected through the rules in the District Plan. However there are thousands of archaeological sites in the district which are not protected by the District Pan.

It would not be possible to list all the archaeological sites in the Inventory of Protected Features.




Should the most significant archaeological sites be listed and protected through the District Plan?

Additional places, structures or groups of buildings

Currently 290 places and structures, and 7 precincts (groups of buildings) are listed in the Inventory of Protected Features. They are protected, to varying degrees, through rules in the District Plan. These places were identified as they meet the criteria listed in the District Plan on page 13-3.
